

# **HEALTH INITIATIVES**

## **BUILDING FUTURES, TOGETHER**

This year, we expanded our health initiatives by collaborating with partners and local organizations to reach a broader audience and foster greater community engagement in health and wellness.



## The Care Bus: 5th Season

The Care Bus is operated by NorWest Community Health Centres in partnership with the Thunder Bay Indigenous Friendship Centre (TBIFC) and the Mindimooyenh Health Clinic operated by the Ontario Native Women's Association (ONWA). This partnership enhanced the quality of services on the Care Bus, as outreach staff from various organizations collaborated to offer frontline work to individuals who may or may not connect with each other, while also creating opportunities for learning and sharing resources. The Care Bus ran from December 2, 2024 to April 18, 2025 and received close to 10,000 client interactions.

## **Increased Support for Vulnerable Populations**

Three pop-up clinics, in collaboration with People Advocating for Change through Empowerment (PACE), Thunder Bay District Health Unit, Mindimooyenh Health Clinic of the Ontario Native Women's Association (ONWA), and Grace Place, helped connect vulnerable populations with low-barrier access to health care and wraparound care services. The Care Bus was essential to support these pop-up clinics in a number of ways, most notably by using the bus for transportation to and from the events and by having outreach workers on the Care Bus to promote the clinics and services.

## Virtual Care Clinic: Care When You Need it

The Northwest Virtual Care Clinic provides urgent care to individuals in Northwestern Ontario 7 days a week from 12pm-8pm EST. Our Nurse Practitioners can help with minor heath issues such as cough, sore throat, sinus infection, skin rash, prescription refill and more. This program started in partnership with Durham Community Health Centre in April 2024 and transitioned to NorWest CHC in January 2025.



# **HEALTH EDUCATION**

## **EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES, TRANSFORMING LIVES**

This year, we expanded our health education by developing educational events to promote harm reduction philosophies and awareness.

## Path 525 & Safer Supply

Educational events were developed for community organizations to increase knowledge on substance use, harm reduction philosophies, education, and awareness. We engaged with community youth at various elementary and high schools, Confederation College, Indigenous communities, Lakehead University during orientation week, Rockin' Recovery, and Thunder Bay Regional Hospital Mental Health Awareness event. Our team participated on a panel for the Ontario Drug Checking Working



Group about the Drug Checking Services that NorWest CHC provides. Team members presented at the Harm Reduction Conference, delivering a presentation about the Spectrum of Substance Use Health Care and services offered.

With the announced closure of Path 525 and Safer Supply, our team committed to supporting local businesses, organizations and community members with free Naloxone training. Efforts to prevent overdose in the community being the goal.

## **FASD Training**

In October 2024, a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) training event titled Strategic Approaches & Collaborative Solutions was held at the Italian Cultural Centre. Led by trainer Donna DeBolt, the session aimed to educate and train service providers, professionals, students, caregivers, families, and individuals diagnosed with FASD on best practices for addressing the complex care needs associated with FASD. The event attracted 154 attendees representing 45 community organizations.



## **IEAPC** Workshop

The IEAPC workshop, held on September 17–18, 2024, at Wanuskewin Heritage Park in Saskatoon, SK, brought together teams from across Canada to strengthen efforts in improving equitable access to palliative care. Hosted by Healthcare Excellence Canada in partnership with the Canadian Partnership Against Cancer, the workshop aimed to support teams in applying equity-focused principles, shared progress on evaluation—including efforts to decolonize and



explore context-based data and measurement strategies. Through open dialogue and shared learning, participants deepened their understanding of equity-based care, land-based medicine, and evaluation practices. By the end of the workshop, teams left with practical strategies to enhance their local initiatives, a better grasp of evaluation approaches, and stronger connections with peers, coaches, and program staff.



## **Civic Engagement**

The Civic Engagement Campaign's purpose was to support political education and voter participation in the provincial and federal elections. We worked with other organizations to mobilize resources, build coalitions, and support clients getting out the vote through transportation to and from polling stations. providing Attestations as a piece of ID, and advocating at polling stations for the client's right to vote.

## **Smoking Cessation Program**

Last year, our Smoking Cessation Program supported approximately 80 individuals in their journey to reduce or guit smoking. We had 67 clients enrolled who received ongoing support through personalized followup calls and in-person appointments. We are proud to report that 19 clients have successfully guit smoking, while 32 others have significantly reduced their daily cigarette use. Clients consistently express appreciation for the continuous support provided,



often sharing that they wouldn't have reached their current milestones without the encouragement and accountability built into the program. Whether working toward reduction or complete cessation, each client's progress is a testament to the program's positive impact and our commitment to supporting healthier lifestyles.



## Longlac

Our Longlac team engaged the local community in a variety of activities and programs last year and collaborated with many different agencies throughout the process. Some of the key programs included the Community Garden and the children's gardening initiatives, Grow with Me and Make it Grow. These programs were developed to educate and involve the entire community - people of all ages - in gardening and in learning how to grow their own food. We also introduced hands-on cooking programs to teach

children how to cook, which proved to be one of the most beneficial experiences we could offer to our youth. These sessions helped them build confidence in the kitchen and understand the importance of nutritious foods. We also participated in numerous events and activities - whether it was health screenings, nutrition, or informational sessions - allowing us to contribute in meaningful ways that supported community health and well-being.

# CARE BUS AWARD

The Care Bus received the 2025
Transformative Change Award from the
Alliance for Healthier Communities. This
award celebrates health champions who lead
transformative solutions that improve
outcomes for people and communities facing
barriers to good health. The Care Bus was
recognized for its innovative, groundbreaking model that brings care directly to
those who need it most.



# COMMUNITY HEALTH CHAMPION AWARD

Our Supervised Consumption Services (SCS) and Consumption and Treatment Services (CTS) sites across Ontario were jointly awarded the 2025 Community Health Champion Award by the Alliance for Healthier Communities Board of Directors. This award recognizes the courage, dedication, and leadership of staff working in CTS programs - past and present - who continue to support harm reduction services and advocate for evidence-informed substance use policy amidst ongoing challenges.

# VOLUNTEER CONTRIBUTIONS



The Digital Skills for Older Adults program continued to grow, offering over 25 sessions with more than 100 participants overall. Volunteers dedicated over 400 hours to various activities, including the Expressive Arts Group, Digital Skills for Older Adults, the Simpson Street Community Garden, Wayfinder, and general program support. Additionally, two high school co-op students completed their placements at NorWest CHC - one completed 200 hours, and the other is nearing their full hours for completion.
